What to Bring

For single students...

Bedding: Bring a pillow, pillowcases, twin bed sheets, bedspread and blankets. (Please, no electric blankets.)

Towels and washcloths, laundry bag/basket

Personal items: Suggestions, not requirements, are a radio, stereo, computer (there are laptop outlets in the classrooms), surge protector power strip with a breaker, alarm clock, sports equipment, electric coffee pot, mini refrigerator, microwave, desk lamp, fan, iron, and small pictures.

Note: No electric space heaters are allowed.

Toiletry items: A carry-all or organizer is helpful.

Clothing for warm and cold weather: Due to the ever-changing weather in Wisconsin, you will want to bring clothes appropriate for both warm and very cold temperatures. You will need a winter coat, boots, hats, and gloves. (Please see the dress value statement, pg. 8, for information on appropriate dress.)

School Supplies: Bible (can be purchased with a student discount in our bookstore), notebooks or laptop for taking notes in class, pens, etc.

For married students...

Housekeeping items: Bring dishes, pots, pans, iron, towels, linens, blankets, fan, clock and lamp. Since most of the apartments do not have running water, you will need to bring buckets and dish pans (or purchase them when you arrive). Upperclassmen will be happy to show you what has worked for them. See page 14 for more information on housing.

Furniture: We recommend you bring your own furniture. If that is not possible, there is a limited amount of furniture available for your use.

Appliances: Refrigerators and stoves are available for all apartments. If you choose to bring your own stove, it must be a 30" gas range. (We have no outlets for electric ranges.) You may also want to bring a microwave oven, fan, small air conditioner, TV, VCR, computer, etc.
No space heaters, please, and no electric blankets.

Decorative items: You may want to bring things that will help make your apartment "home," such as pictures, knick-knacks, etc. Items to be hung on walls should be fastened onto school-approved picture hangers.

Bibles and school supplies: These can be purchased with a student discount in our bookstore.

Clothing for both warm and cold weather: Due to the ever-changing weather in Wisconsin, you will want to bring clothes appropriate for both warm and very cold temperatures. You will need a winter coat, boots, hats, and gloves. (See dress code for particulars on appropriate dress.)

Dress Value Statement

In order to help you consider what clothing to bring, we want to make you familiar with our Dress Value Statement. Please be aware that it may change but this should help you plan for your upcoming semester:

New Tribes Mission USA recognizes that there are a number of different personal preferences and convictions in the area of appearance and dress.

Our training centers include missionaries and students from a wide range of ages, international and cultural backgrounds, and from varied sending churches. We value a community that functions out of sensitivity to these differences.

We request that our students appear neat and modest while avoiding extremes. Each believer bears the responsibility before God to be sensitive to the people around us.

Despite our culture's pressure to be individualistic, we challenge our students to attempt to respectfully and modestly fit into whatever community God has placed them in, rather than attempt to be distinct from the community. Mutual respect and consideration between believers requires an ongoing discussion within the body of Christ. Our desire is to foster an environment where we can challenge each other to continually evaluate our lives and choices under the light of God's Word and consider how our choices may impact those around us both now and in the future.

We are asking that you dress consistently with the cultural "norm" we live in rather than the norm of a smaller cultural group. Please let us know if you have any questions or concerns with our expectation.

Entertainment Value Statement

In order to help you consider what games, movies and music to bring, we want to make you familiar with our Entertainment Value Statement. Please be aware that it may change but this should help you plan for your upcoming semester:

In the discussion on entertainment, movies, TV, games and music, NTM USA Training values Biblical liberty in Christ which is not freedom to serve myself and my own interests but freedom to serve the needs of others. Our training centers recognize the various freedoms and differing convictions that exist within the body of Christ and yet we desire to see a training community that functions in unity and integrity. Our goal is to foster a community that functions in love and mutual respect. Each believer has the personal responsibility to exercise their freedoms in love and out of consideration to the convictions of others.

God calls each believer to live a life of holiness in all areas of life. We will hold each student personally responsible to consider every choice they make in the light of this truth. Media and various art forms have always been a vehicle for cultural expression. Believers must consider whether they are being “conformed by the world” in the choices they make. NTM USA training desires a community that is not compromised by any form of entertainment that is graphic or explicit in the areas of violence, sex, nudity and adult content. Given the nature of our campuses we do request that students respect public areas which include the dormitories and student centers and refrain from any choices which may cause offense. We want the public areas on campus to be enjoyed by all. If you are ever in doubt please talk with a trainer. In the multitude of counsel there is much wisdom.

Not only are we as believers called to consider holiness and how choices affect others but we are also accountable for the wise use of the time that God has given us. Each believer is responsible to consider the amount of time that is invested in entertainment. The purpose for our existence as a school is to train believers for ministry and we appeal to each student to make choices which will not hinder their training.

Academics

Where Bible Education and Missions Are One is our school motto. With this in mind, we trust your training experience at New Tribes Bible Institute will be life changing. You will be studying the great doctrines of the Bible. Your instructors will be emphasizing the necessity of living a godly life, as well as the Christian's responsibility and purpose in taking the good news about Christ to a lost world, especially to those who have never heard.

You will register for all classes during your initial days on campus. You will be taking approximately 15 required credit hours and one or more electives, as described in our school catalog. (Married women may take a reduced academic load that corresponds with their particular family circumstances.) During registration, you will receive detailed information that will make the process very simple.

All required classes are held Monday-Friday from 9:00 A.M. until 12:30 P.M. Elective classes are taught at 8:00 A.M. or after lunch at 1:10 P.M. This generally allows for blocks of time for outside employment, should you find it necessary to work.

All textbooks are sold in our school bookstore. They may be purchased before classes begin. Our bookstore offers students a 20% discount on all books (including textbooks and Bibles) and other items.

If you have taken Bible courses at other Christian colleges and you would like to see if we might transfer credit for those to New Tribes Bible Institute, please have a transcript sent to us. A brief description of the courses you have taken would be helpful, as well. Contact the Dean of Education regarding transfer credits.

You will discover that an in-depth study of the living Word of God will be unlike any other course of study you have undertaken. We are looking forward to having you in our classes, responding to the life-changing truths of God's Word.

Student Information

Married Students

Married students live in apartments either in our main building or in an adjacent apartment building. Most apartments have a combined living room/kitchen/dining area, and the number of bedrooms depends on family size and apartment availability.

Some student apartments do not have running water or a private bathroom. There are utility closets located on each floor where students may obtain water for preparing food and washing dishes. Restrooms with showers are located on each floor.

You will be provided a storage area, where you may store suitcases, out-of-season clothing, boxes, etc.

There is a central laundry facility on the ground floor of the main building. At the beginning of the semester, students living on campus will receive times to do their laundry each week. A laundry fee is included in your student fees for on-campus students and covers the cost of doing laundry for the semester.

NTBI is a place where people can make life-long friends. With married students living on campus in apartment-style housing, there are many opportunities for informal get-togethers on a day-to-day basis. Sharing school, family, and life experiences often creates close bonds.

Single Students

Facilities: Your dorm will consist of a combination sitting/study room and bedrooms. It will be furnished with bunk beds and dressers. In the sitting room, we will provide a desk, chair, and bookshelf. There will also be a couch in each sitting room. Because you will be sharing a room with others, there will be a limited amount of storage space per student. Restrooms and showers are located either in the dorm or in close proximity. On the ground floor we have a central laundry facility for your use. A laundry fee is included in your student fees for on-campus students and covers the cost of doing laundry for the semester.

Dorm Detail: Each student is responsible to do daily jobs that help maintain cleanliness and order in the dorm.

Resident Assistants: Each dorm will be overseen by a Resident Assistant (RA), who is there to help you in your adjustment to dorm life.

Telephone Service

You can receive calls directly into your dorm/apartment. Due to possible last-minute changes in the housing arrangements, the phone numbers are not given out until registration.

You can make local calls from your room free of charge. Long distance calls are possible if you have a phone card (AT&T, Ameritech, Bell, MCI, Sprint, etc.). All cards will work through your room phones. You also can call collect and/or charge a 3rd party, but you cannot receive collect calls or charge calls to your phone.

Computers and Internet:

Although NTBI does not require anyone to have a computer, it is strongly encouraged and helpful with homework assignments and research, which students are asked to do on a routine basis.

NTBI offers our students wired and wireless access to the internet; called the “student internet”. This allows a student to access the internet throughout the campus housing areas and the computer lab, located in the campus library.

The “student internet” allows our students to browse the Internet, check email, etc. We know that with this privilege comes a responsibility to deal with both desirable and undesirable content. Because of this, NTBI actively filters all content and information that comes through the “student internet”.

The cost of using the “student internet” system is included in your semester fees. NTBI offers limited support to help you get set up on the network. If you have any questions concerning the “student internet”, please feel free to contact the NTBI IT Department at it-wauk@ntm.org.

Campus Ministry

Students are required to serve an average of three hours per week in Campus Ministry by providing an excellent environment in which to learn God's Word and take it to the ends of the earth for His glory. Examples of Campus Ministry (CM) include campus cleaning, phone reception, secretarial tasks, kitchen duty, etc. CM helps to keep tuition costs down by not having to hire people to maintain the physical environment. It also provides students an opportunity to live out, in real-life situations, the truths they have learned from the Word. CM works by pulling together in team ministry, serving each other.

Social Life

At New Tribes Bible Institute, we consider social life an important aspect of our growth in the grace and knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. It is important to have times to relax and just have fun together. For this reason, we plan several social activities as part of our school life.

We always have special activities planned during the busy days of orientation. These activities allow the new students to meet our entire staff in an informal setting.

There are planned socials for the single students, separate socials for the married students, and socials in which both get together. In the past, we have had skit nights, coffee house socials, ice-skating, miniature golfing, movie nights, and more.

There are also opportunities to participate in sports activities. A variety of sports held in our gym gives the students a chance to participate in the sport of their expertise and choice. Students may also participate in Inter Mural sports.

Church Involvement

New Tribes Mission is not a church organization. We are not affiliated with any denomination. We exist to support and assist the local church. We believe that it is every believer's responsibility to value and participate regularly in a local assembly of believers. We find encouragement, balance and accountability through our participation and submission to the local church. Our expectation is that you will take the first few weeks of the semester to visit churches. Please don't have expectations to find a church that is as comfortable as your home church. You will need to look for a church where you can be ministered to and where you can be a blessing to others. Please plan on staying at one church the rest of your time at school. We are trusting that the Lord will honor and teach you many things through your time there.

Evangelism

Our required evangelism practicum is based on the Evangelism in a Post Modern World course. This course is designed to equip students to communicate the gospel clearly and effectively to North American culture, as well as lay a foundation for cross-cultural ministry in the future. The practicum provides opportunity to build relationships in the community through local churches, one-on-one studies, prison ministry, etc. The practicum is designed to equip, encourage, and aid the student in various ways to be successful in their task.

School Calendar/Schedule

Single students may arrive anytime on August 20th -21st.

Married students may arrive any time August 16th – 21st.

Freshman Registration/Orientation is Sunday, August, 22nd, 2010

Any students who plan to arrive prior to these dates will need *special permission from their respective dean*. Because the semester fees do not go into effect until registration weekend, any student who arrives before the designated times will be charged additional rent.

Orientation starts on Monday, August 23rd. You must be settled in your apartment by that time and ready to attend orientation.

School and holiday breaks – Students may stay at the school during Thanksgiving and spring break and will not be charged extra for that time. However, during Christmas break, there is an extra charge for staying at the school. Married students may leave their personal belongings in their apartments if they do not stay over the summer. Single students must move out of their dorm rooms. If returning in the fall, they will be given storage space for their belongings for the summer months.

We attempt to have our semester breaks coincide with both the Waukesha Public Schools and Waukesha Christian Schools.

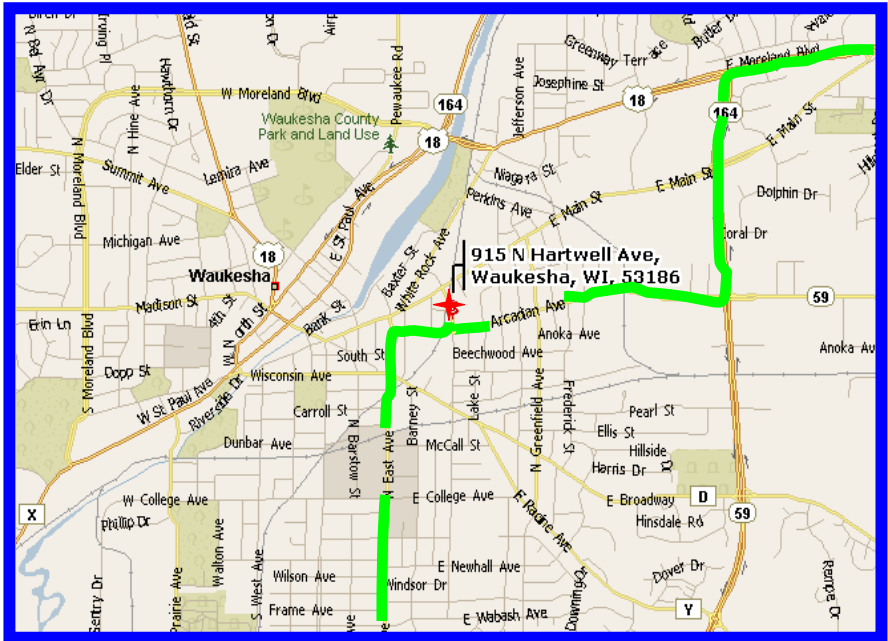
